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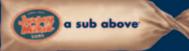
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NOTES FROM THE PUBLISHER'S DESK

I read a Gallup poll the other day from 2013 that surveyed 150,000

US workers about their attitude toward their jobs and 70% of those surveyed were "disengaged" with their work. Imagine what that does to morale if 70% of the people are uninspired by their jobs or their bosses? Imagine what it does to production? More and more, I see articles and blogs across my social media feed about how to better your work environment, for both employees and bosses. What is the deal with work?

I know that we've all felt at times that our work was not attractive, but what makes it that way? Work is supposed to be an important part of the existence of a human being. When God created Adam, one of the first things He gave Adam in that paradise, was not a house or a car or an iPhone, but a job. We also know that when Adam and Eve chose to sin in the Garden of Eden, part of the curse of sin was that work would be seen as "painful toil" (Genesis 3:17). Do you realize that quite possibly, before sin entered the world, our work would have been a wonderful enjoyable experience? Sadly, now just a small handful of piano manufacturers exist in the US, Korea, Japan, China and Europe. So, if you want more intelligence, more social structure and interplay, better get your gang a piano. If you want less Alzheimer's, dementia and autism, get a piano to massage your mind with music therapy, now a popular and needed geriatric and pediatric science. Whatever you domake music on the piano or the keyboard and live a longer happier and healthier life.

Seasonal Allergy Triggers

Allergic reactions occur when the body's immune system attacks an often harmless substance like animal dander, food or pollen. Medication can help reduce the severity of such reactions, but some alleray sufferers find allergic reactions inconvenient nuisances even with medication.

Understanding what triggers allergic reactions may help some people avoid them or make them easier to handle. The following are some of the more common allergy triggers and how men and women suffering from allergies can avoid them.

Pollen

Pollen is perhaps the best-known allergy trigger. A fine, often yellow substance that's essential to the fertilization of flowers, pollen can be spread by wind, insects or other animals. Hay fever sufferers may sneeze or experience a runny nose and itchy eyes when pollen spreads. Over-the-counter medications, such as Claritin®, can be especially effective at relieving symptoms of seasonal allergies. But allergy sufferers also can combat high pollen counts by staying indoors on windy days and closing their windows and running their air conditioners.

Pet dander

Dander are flakes of skin in an animal's fur or hair. Because of their microscopic size, these flakes of skin can easily attach and remain attached to bedding,

fabrics and furniture. Many people keep their pets even if they develop allergies to dander. Should such a situation arise, do not allow your pet into your bedroom, bathe the animal regularly and remove carpeting in favor of bare floors or washable ruas.

Mold

Mold is a furry growth of minute fungal hyphae that is often found in damp parts of a home, such as basements

and bathrooms. Mold also can be found in grass and mulch, triggering allergic reactions when men and women spend time in their yards. To avoid an allergic reaction triggered by mold, make sure moist areas of your home get fresh air regularly and routinely clean ceilings or other areas where mold may grow.

Dust mites

Tiny bugs that live in bedding, carpets, curtains, upholstery, and mattresses, dust mites feed on dead skin cells from people and pets. Dust mites also may feed on bacteria, fungi and pollen. Dust mites thrive in humid conditions, but these pests can be combatted with hypoallergenic pillows and mattress covers. Removing materials that collect dust, such as carpet, also can reduce the number of dust mites.



Tips for Adult Students Returning to School

Adults return to school for a variety of reasons. Some might be spurred by a desire to

to school when they know exactly what they want to study or which courses they need to take to complete a degree or earn a certificate. If you have not already mapped out such a plan, do so before enrolling in any classes. The cost of a college education has no doubt increased considerably since you last stepped foot on campus, so you don't want to be signing up for costly classes that will not help you accomplish what you hope to accomplish by returning to school.

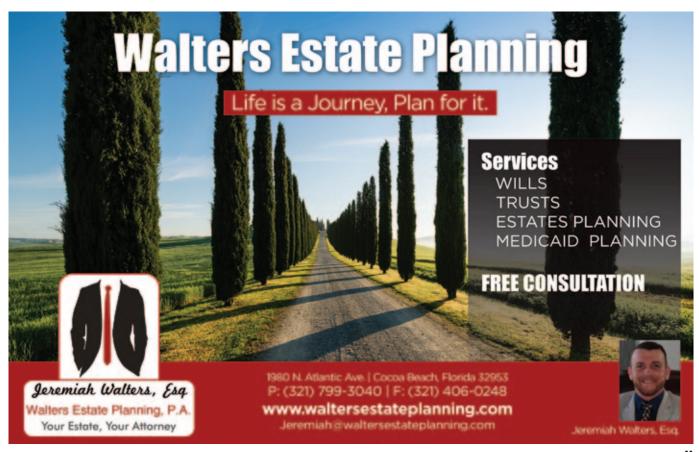
Research your Options

Just because you are an adult returning to school does not mean you are ineligible for scholarships

or other forms of financial aid. The United States Department of Labor maintains a scholarship search engine at www.careerinfonet.org where students of all ages and academic levels can search for scholarships, grants and other financial aid opportunities to determine if they are eligible for some help paying for tuition. In addition, adults returning to school may want to discuss their plans with their employers, especially if they are looking to continue working in their current fields. Employers may have programs in place to subsidize employees looking to continue their education.

Don't be Discouraged

Many adults mulling a return to school are hesitant to do so because they feel as if they will be the only older students in classrooms filled with millennials. However, the National Center for Education Statistics predicts a 14 percent increase in enrollment of students 25 and older between 2011 and 2021, suggesting that adults going back to school are unlikely to be the only graybeards in their classrooms.





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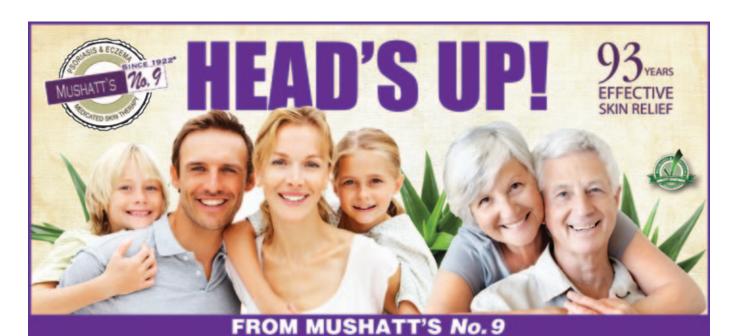












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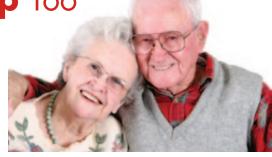
Dear Friends,

As most of you know from reading my columns and from your own life experiences, getting older is not always fun, or easy. Many of us worry about having enough money after retirement to live with some semblance of dignity. Set the word "dignity" aside for the time being and let's just talk about getting older and having others understand what that means.

Elders represent 22% of Brevard County's population, whereas children represent 19%. Of my taxes, 44.6% goes to children's education while 0% goes to seniors. In addition to taxpayer money, Brevard County and its municipalities receive federal funds through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. The CDBG was established by Congress in 1974 to improve the quality of life in low and moderate income areas.

So why am I am talking about this in my column? Helping Seniors asked for CDBG funds to help pay for our information specialist, who directs elderly clients to needed services. One way to qualify for CDBG funding is to provide a low/moderate limited clientele activity that benefits a specific group of people automatically presumed by HUD to be principally low/moderate income persons. Helping Seniors fulfills this requirement by serving elders. In the past nine months, we have managed nearly 450 individual cases.





Unfortunately, due to government over-management and a plethora of paperwork that must be signed by those receiving service, we have been prohibited from receiving CDBG funds. Since most of our clients are served over the phone, they circumvent the office visit precluding us getting their financial data, age, race, etc., i.e., a signed piece of paper.

I understand the need to qualify for federal funding, but are we making the qualifications too difficult? Isn't it enough that people are being helped: dentures are provided, hungry people are directed to food sources, and people existing on \$800 a month and food stamps suddenly learn about VA Aid and Attendance? Information and education are the key to empowerment, and that is what Helping Seniors and similar organizations do to help people.

The result of over-management is that seniors do not get the funding they need. We have to follow rules, but at times the rules need changing. Does it make any difference whether or not the 89 year old needing help is wealthy, of average income, poor or low income, Caucasian, Black, Hispanic, single, etc.? It shouldn't make any difference! We need to simplify. We need to develop better ways of directing information and/or funding to the elderly.

A Brevard County Aging Plan will help equalize the funding field and ensure that seniors and juniors are both treated well. It is great that United Way will help feed 2,000 children this summer, but how about the 245,000 seniors in Brevard, thousands of whom need the help described in this article? We need a community effort to help seniors and juniors, not one at the expense of the other. Seniors get hungry, lonely and depressed too!

By the way, if you would like to help Helping Seniors of Brevard, we are in fact a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that could benefit by donations and volunteers. Dear Edna,

Bible prophecies are history written in advance. In the Old Testament, there were over one hundred prophecies foretelling the first coming of our Messiah—and Jesus fulfilled every one! Now think about this, there are five times as many prophecies concerning our Savior's second coming. We are living in exciting times because we're seeing many of these predictions coming true before our very eyes! The word "rapture" comes from the Greek word harpazo and means "caught up." In 1 Thessalonians 4:16-18, the apostle Paul provides us with five important details pertaining to Christ's return.

"For the Lord Himself will come down from Heaven, with a loud command, with the voice of the archangel and with the trumpet call of God, and the dead in Christ will rise first. After that, we who are still alive and are left will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. And so we will be with the Lord forever. Therefore encourage one another with these words" (NIV).

Chicken (Turkey) Croquettes

- 3 tbsp unsalted butter
- 1 medium onion minced
- 1 1/2 tsp minced fresh sage
- 1 1/2 tsp minced fresh thyme
- 2 cups chopped cooked chicken or turkey
- 1/4 cup half and half (or heavy cream)

Melt butter in a large frying pan over medium-high heat. Add onions, salt and pepper and cook until onions are soft and still the same color. Add sage and thyme and cook for 1 minute. Add chicken and half and half and cook until liquid evaporates (1 or 2 minutes). Pour in a large bowl and let cook for 15 minutes.

Add potatoes, flour and egg and season with salt and pepper. drop 2 tbsp of mixture

1 cup mashed potatoes (leftovers are good to use)

1/4 cup all purpose flour

1 large egg lightly beaten

1 1/2 Italian bread crumbs Salt and Pepper to taste

1 1/2 cups vegetable oil to fry croquettes

into a shallow bowl of breadcrumbs, turn to coat and pat into 2 inch disks. Arrange in a single layer on a baking sheet, and refrigerate for 10 minutes.

Heat 1/3 inch oil in a frying pan over medium heat. working in batches, cook croquettes in a single layer until golden brown, about 2 minutes per side. Place on a paper towel to drain and serve.



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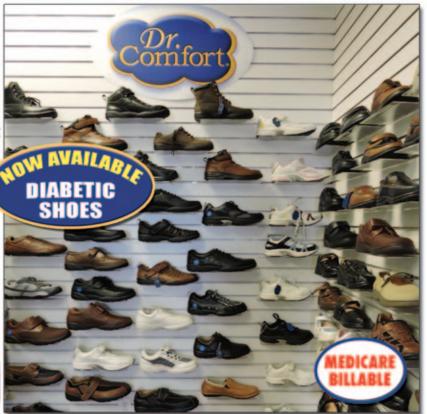
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Community Movers & Shakers

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Vaccines and Their Side Effects

Vaccines are recommended to prevent disease and keep us healthy. Vaccines are responsible for something called "herd immunity." If the majority of people in a community have been vaccinated against a certain disease, an unvaccinated person is less likely to get sick himself. During the past 60 years, vaccines have helped eradicate smallpox and almost wiped out all cases of polio. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention also reports a 99 percent reduction in the incidence of bacterial meningitis since the introduction of the vaccination against the disease.

Despite the good they can do, some people are hesitant to follow recommended vaccination schedules for fear of side effects. Some side effects are legitimate, but many studies continue to indicate there is no relationship between vaccines and autism.

Vaccines undergo rigorous safety testing prior to being approved for use and,

once approved, are continually monitored for safety. But as with any medication, there are possible side effects associated

with vaccinations, although most are not serious. The following are some side effects that people may experience after being vaccinated.

- injection site reactions, such as pain, swelling, a small lump, and redness
- mild fever
- shivering
- fatigue
- headache
- muscle and joint pain

More serious side effects, such as allergic reactions, are rare. Parents should monitor their children after vaccinations for any behavior or health changes. Some doctors recommend taking a fever reducer, such as ibuprofen, if a fever develops and makes a child or adult feel uncomfortable after he or she is vaccinated.

Many vaccination side effects are shortlived and not a cause for concern. But if side effects do not subside shortly after

> you have been vaccinated, bring this to the attention of your physician.

It can be tempting to forgo vaccines out of fear of any of the aforementioned side effects. But the benefits of vaccines far outweigh the risks. Although they are not 100 percent effective

in every person, vaccines do provide the best defense against diseases that can kill or injure millions of people.

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DATA RECOVERY: IMAC'S WITH FUSION HARD DRIVES CAN CRASH TOO!

SPOTLIGHT ON COMPUTING

Apple's Fusion technology is a proprietary version of what's become known as 'hybrid hard drives' because they combine traditional magnetic storage technology with the faster solid-state memory (similar to USB flash drives). Hybrid storage systems can be one of the best upgrades you can make to any computer because for a little more money than a traditional hard drive, they can greatly improve the overall performance of your computer.

They accomplish this by storing oftenused programs and files on the faster solid-state portion and less-used files on the traditional drive. The intelligence built into the drive monitors your activity and automatically moves programs and files to the faster portion as you use the computer.

Apple's Fusion technology, however, does have a dark side when it fails. Unlike traditional hybrid hard drives made by companies like Seagate and Western Digital, the Fusion's proprietary system makes it very difficult to reconstruct data when it fails.

Apple Stores lack any of the sophisticated data recovery tools and knowledge to even attempt such a difficult task, so



all they try are a few simple ways to try to access your files. Even the most sophisticated data recovery labs would have a difficult time reconstructing your data because of the proprietary nature of the Fusion drive. This is not to say that it's impossible, just incredibly difficult, and, as a result, generally very expensive. Many newer storage technologies are proving to be more difficult than traditional technologies when it comes to recovering data from failed drives.

I can remember when a 40 Megabyte hard drive was considered 'bigger than you'll ever need.' Now, the smallest iPhone or typical USB flash drive has 400 times that storage capability.

Traditional mechanical drives that store data magnetically have been around so long that the methods for recovering data from them have evolved tremendously, making a successful data recovery more likely. When solid-state memory devices such as flash drives, camera cards, and SSDs fail, physical damage to the actual circuitry can often make recovery extremely difficult or even impossible.

Additionally, when you throw in proprietary technology that connects and stores the data on hybrid devices, like what Apple is doing, yet another layer of complexity is added making recovery even that much less likely.

The moral to this story is clear: The newer and more sophisticated your storage system is, the more important it is to have a well thought out backup scheme in place. Incorporating the 3-2-1 method of backup should eliminate the need to ever pay for expensive data recovery:

You should have -- Three copies of your data on two different devices with at least one copy off-site.

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Dry Eyes? We Can Help...

Having dry eyes is one of the most common and frustrating conditions a person can experience.

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DRY EYES - AN OFTEN IGNORED AND FREQUENTLY FRUSTRATING EYE CONDITION

"Having dry eyes can be quite frustrating for the person who suffers from them," according to Dr. Michael N. Mandese, O.D., F.A.A.O., of The Eye Institute for Medicine & Surgery. "Dry eyes can be painful, they can cause blurred vision, they can lead to abrasions and chronic infections, and in general, dry eyes can be a rather difficult condition to live with," continues Dr. Mandese, the Neuro-Eye Diseases Specialist at The Eye Institute.

"To the surprise of many people, excessive, uncontrolled tearing can also be caused by having dry eyes, as the body attempts to compensate for the lack of a high quality tear film," adds Dr. Eric R. Straut, Optometric Physician and Low Vision Specialist at The Eye Institute.

"At The Eye Institute, complaints of dry, irritated eyes are taken very seriously. We understand how this condition can diminish one's quality of life," states Dr. Mandese.

Diagnosing Dry Eye Syndrome

The first step towards finding a solution to dry eyes is making an accurate diagnosis. This starts with a thorough medical history. "We want to know if you have a history of any chronic diseases, particularly inflammatory conditions, autoimmune disorders, and diseases of the thyroid, endocrine system or cancer, as each of these can affect the ways in which they are treated and how symptoms manifest," remarks Dr. Straut.

Examples of medical conditions that can lead to dry eyes include lupus, sarcoid rheumatoid arthritis, Crohn's disease, irritable bowel syndrome, ankylosing spondylitis, pregnancy, thyroid disease, and diabetes. Chemotherapy or radiation treatments can also cause or worsen the symptoms associated with dry eyes and, due to hormonal changes, women are more likely than men to suffer from dry eyes.

"Once a person's medical history has been fully reviewed, my colleagues and I carefully listen to the patient's concerns. We frequently hear that people who are avid readers or computer users suffer from dry eye as they blink less frequently when engaged in these activities," states Dr. Mandese.

"People who are frequently exposed to direct air flow from air conditioning or the wind on an ongoing basis are more likely than others to experience irritation associated with dry eyes," adds Dr. Straut.

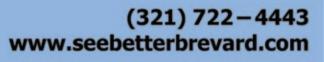
"Once people reach their 40s, it is not uncommon for people to begin to experience redness, dryness and irritation, particularly if they wear contact lenses," according to Dr. Mandese.

Treating Dry Eyes

Dr. Mandese explains that the successful treatment of dry eyes requires a customized and individual approach to ensure that the dry eye sufferer achieves maximum relief. "We believe in a full body approach to dry eye treatment, including nutritional counseling, the use of certain omega 3, 6, and 9 supplements, careful selection of lubricant tear drops, and in many cases the placement of intracanalicular punctal plugs." Intracanalicular punctal plugs are a major advancement in the treatment of dry eyes. "They fit much better than previous generations of plugs. Patients find them to be comfortable, in most cases not being able to tell that these plugs are in place, with the exception of the fact that the eye irritation that they previously experienced has been eliminated," adds Dr. Mandese.

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What are Probiotics and should I be taking them? WBrevardHEALTHANIANCE



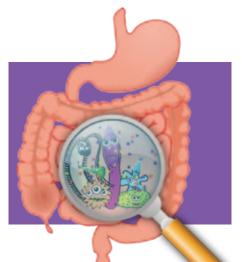

Probiotics may help keep you healthy by decreasing the number of "bad" bacteria in

your gut that can cause infections or inflammation and by replacing the body's "good" bacteria which then helps to keep your body functioning properly. There are several studies showing that probiotics and prebiotics may be beneficial for overall health and wellness and the risks and benefits may be worth discussing with your health care provider.

Digestive tract conditions: Probiotic supplements may be useful in treating and preventing inflammatory conditions, such as chronic stomach inflammation and ulcers caused by Helicobacter pylori bacterium. They may also be helpful in treating

constipation, irritable bowel syndrome, acid reflux, spastic colon; shortening the duration of infectious diarrhea; and reducing the recurrence of bladder and colorectal cancer. Some studies suggest that probiotics are helpful in preventing diarrhea - a common side effect of treatment with antibiotics. They have



also been shown to prevent or treat urinary tract infections and vaginal yeast infections in women.

Other conditions in which probiotics are being studied: skin infections such as eczema in children; mental illness; childhood stomach and respiratory infections, allergies and asthma; sleeping problems; joint stiffness; lactose intolerance, and for boosting the immune system.

Not all probiotics are created equal nor do they all work the same for specific conditions. It is especially important for people who are immunosuppressed or who have irritable bowel syndrome, Crohn's disease or rheumatoid arthritis to

check with their health care providers before taking any probiotic supplements. Always inform your health care provider of any supplement you may be taking as they may interfere with your medications.



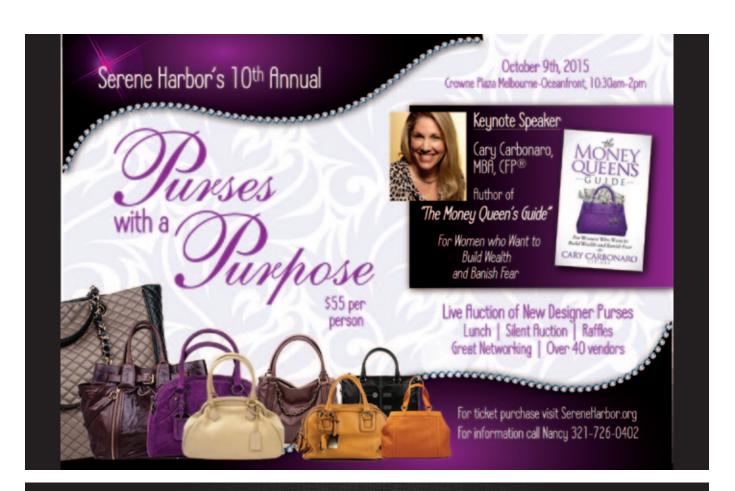


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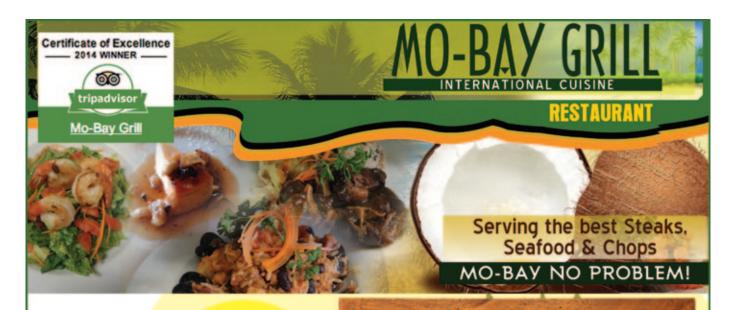
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\$100 in Professional Care Saves a \$5,000 Investment

If, you think professional care in the fitting of hearing aids doesn't matter, just ask Gerald Fox, our featured patient this month.

Gerald was referred to us after the dispenser he got his Widex Clear hearing aids from had gone out of business.

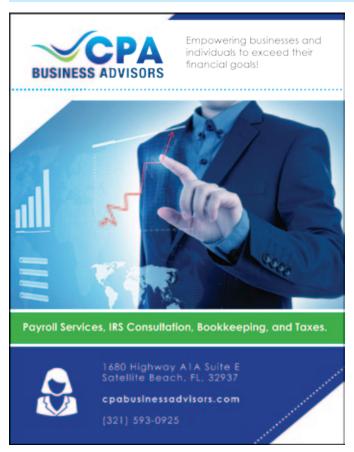

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WHAT'S YOUR ANGEL 10?

CCM: Together, doing life RIGHT!

When people think about angels, they usually picture women

(and sometimes men) with wings and halos. Sometimes they picture adorable chubby babies with wings, such as in Nicolas Poussin's French Baroque Adoration of the Shepherds.

Surprise! Not only do angels not look like this, but there are different types of angels!

Messenger Angels - Malachim

The English word "angel" comes from the Greek angelos, which means 'messenger'. In the Old Testament, with two exceptions, the Hebrew word for "angel" is malach, also meaning 'messenger'. The prophet Malachi took his name from this word. He was himself a messenger, and he prophesied about the coming of "the messenger of the covenant", Jesus Christ (Malachi 3:1).

An example of messenger angels are the two angels who accompanied the pre-incarnate Christ when He visited Abraham in Genesis 18. These are the same angels that spoken of in Hebrews 13:2: "Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it." These angels take a form indistinguishable from human beings.

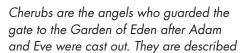
Angels Magnifying the Power and Holiness of God -Cherubim

These are the angels usually depicted as babies in artwork, but this couldn't be further from the truth. In fact, cherubs are pretty frightening, so it is no wonder that created the human-appearing messenger angel class.

CALVARY Chapel Academy

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in Ezekiel chapters as having four faces—that of a man, a lion, an ox, and an eagle, and each have four wings. In their appearance, the cherubim "had the likeness of a man". These cherubim used two of their wings for flying and the other two for covering their bodies. Under their wings the cherubim appeared to have the form, or likeness, of a man's hand.

Satan is referred to as a "guardian cherub" in Ezekiel 28:16.

Angels as Agents of Purification and God's Majesty -Seraphim

These are the angels who placed a hot coal against the prophet Isaiah's lips to take his guilt away and atone for his sin in Isaiah 6:7. The same chapter of Isaiah tells us that seraphim have six wings "...With two wings they covered their faces, with two they covered their feet, and with two they were flying. And they were calling to one another: 'Holy, holy, holy is the Lord Almighty; the whole earth is full of his glory.' At the sound of their voices the doorposts and thresholds shook and the temple was filled with smoke." (Isaiah 6:2-4). Seraphs are angels who worship God continually.

Why Did God Create Angels?

Hebrews 1:14 tells us that one of the duties of angels is to be "ministering spirits sent to serve those who will inherit salvation". We see in Revelation 5:11-14 that another function of angels is to worship God around His throne.

Most Importantly

Grace and peace to you from him who is, and who was, and who is to come, and from the seven spirits before his throne, and from Jesus Christ, who is the faithful witness, the firstborn from the dead, and the ruler of the kings of the earth.

To him who loves us and has freed us from our sins by his blood, and has made us to be a kingdom and priests to serve his God and Father—to him be glory and power for ever and ever! Amen. (Revelation 1:4-6).











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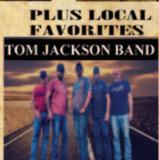
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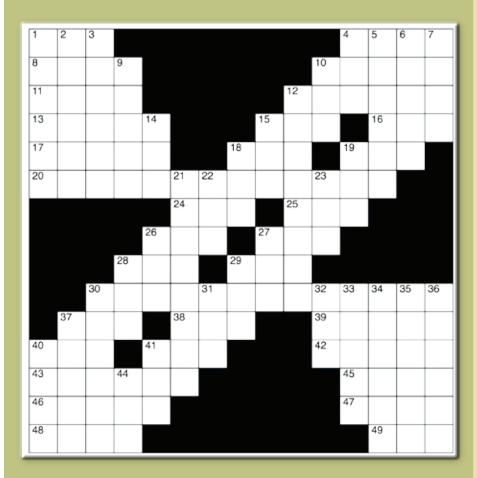

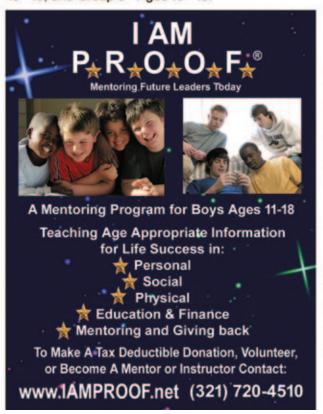
